
Dave Suddaby, BirdWatch Ireland's Reserves Officer, describes the attractions of Termoncarragh Meadows reserve on the Mullet peninsula, Co Mayo.

BirdWatch Ireland's Termoncarragh Meadows reserve was established between 2004 and 2005 with support-funding from the **EU LIFE-Nature** programme and our members. The reserve extends to around 20 hectares split between semi-improved grasslands and coastal pastures that provide a home for an array of rare and important wildlife.

With ongoing management, the grasslands are attractive to Corncrakes, as well as Skylarks and Meadow Pipits, during the summer months and to geese, Choughs and Rock Doves during the winter months.





Exploring the reserve

As winter turns to spring the grasslands come alive, with the songs of **Skylarks** filling the air. These are soon joined by displaying **Meadow Pipits** and **Reed Buntings**, followed by the arrival of summer migrants, such as **Swallows** and **Sedge Warblers** as they take up their summer residency.

Then, as the spring day turns to night the rasping 'crex crex' song of the secretive **Corncrake** indicates its arrival from Africa. Here, they spend the summer in the tall, species-rich herb vegetation within the grasslands. At this time, they are often heard

alongside **Grasshopper Warblers** 'reeling' and **Snipe** 'drumming' through the night.

As the grasslands grow they turn into flower-rich meadows, offering a wonderful floral display in June. Looking closer, some very rare insects can be found, including several scarce bumblebees feeding on the clovers, such as the **Great Yellow Bumblebee**.

The distinctive red-billed **Choughs** and their charismatic 'chow' calls can often be heard as they feed in the short turf of the coastal pastures.

As the autumn wanes to winter, the morning and evening skies come alive with the sounds of **Barnacle Geese** as they fly

back and forth between the offshore islands and Termoncarragh Meadows. This spectacle is mixed with the sights and sounds of other wintering birds, including flocks of wintering waders — including Golden Plovers and Curlews — calling as they fly from the beach and rocky shore to the grasslands. They are often spooked by a Peregrine hunting for a meal.

Work we are doing at Termoncarragh

Our aim is to make a real contribution to priority species conservation and, where possible, offer natural places where people can enjoy wildlife.





To accomplish this, local branches are playing a vital role, and your support as an individual or a member of a local branch is also crucial.

Our management aims at Termoncarragh are to:

- Maintain and enhance breeding Corncrake numbers;
- Enhance the numbers of farmland birds, both breeding and wintering;
- Enhance the numbers of bees, especially the Great Yellow Bumblebee;
- Enhance the wider flora and fauna:
- Maintain the remote wilderness and disturbance-free status of the area.

Visitor informationHow to find the reserve

Termoncarragh Meadows lie approximately seven kilometres west of Belmullet. From Belmullet, take the R313 (the road to

Blacksod) but immediately turn off at the first right turn. Follow the road through Corclogh townland. Termoncarragh Lough will appear to the left, while the meadows are located to the west (national grid reference: F 646 356).

Parking is available at the beach to the north of the reserve at Scotchport. Note, there is no public transport to Termoncarragh, although taxis are available from Belmullet, if desired.

There are no facilities. This is a remote location and at times there may be **grazing animals** present, so please do take care. To reduce disturbance to the wildlife, particularly during the summer months, please view the reserve from the adjoining public road and track. Please keep dogs on a leash and under close control
